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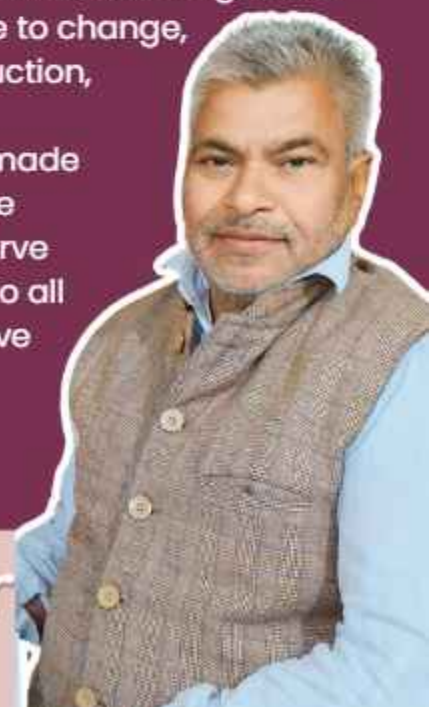
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MESSAGE FROM SECRETARY

By providing vocational training and opportunities, we are working to break the cycle of poverty and unemployment that often affects these young individuals. One of our most notable achievements has been the revival of water sources in the community. Through collective efforts, we have constructed ponds, gully plugs, and sandbag dams. These initiatives not only address water scarcity but also embody the spirit of collectivism, volunteerism, and ownership. The voluntary labor provided by the community has been inspiring, showcasing the power of collective action in achieving sustainable outcomes. Furthermore, we have promoted kitchen gardening with organic farming, encouraging families to grow their own vegetables. This initiative aims to improve diets and overall health while reducing malnutrition in the community. However, our journey has not been without challenges. We have faced obstacles such as limited access to resources, resistance to change, and logistical difficulties. Less rainfall has reduced agricultural production, raising concerns about the profitability of farming as a sustainable livelihood. Additionally, connecting to broader markets for survivor-made products has been difficult due to our remote locations. 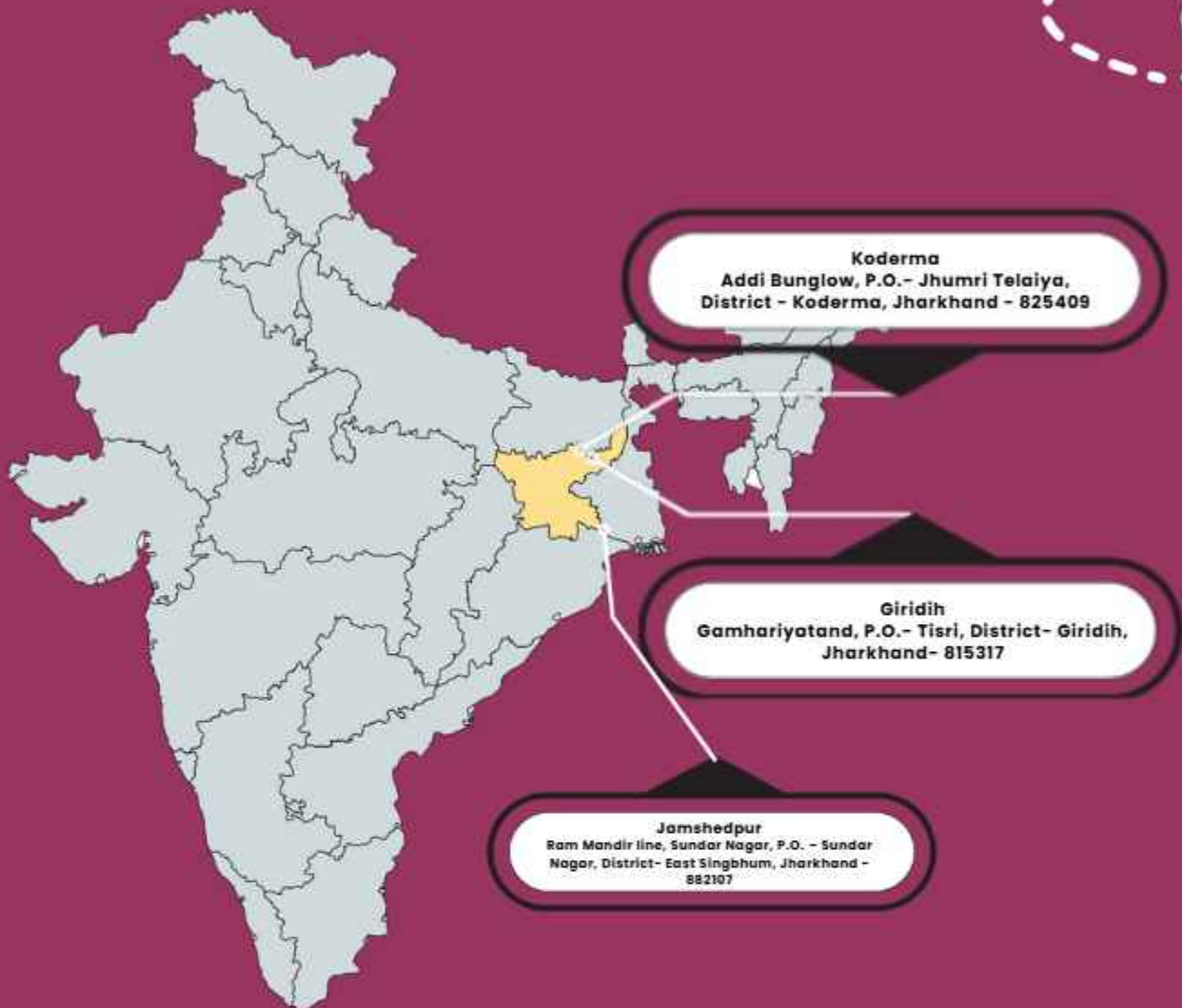

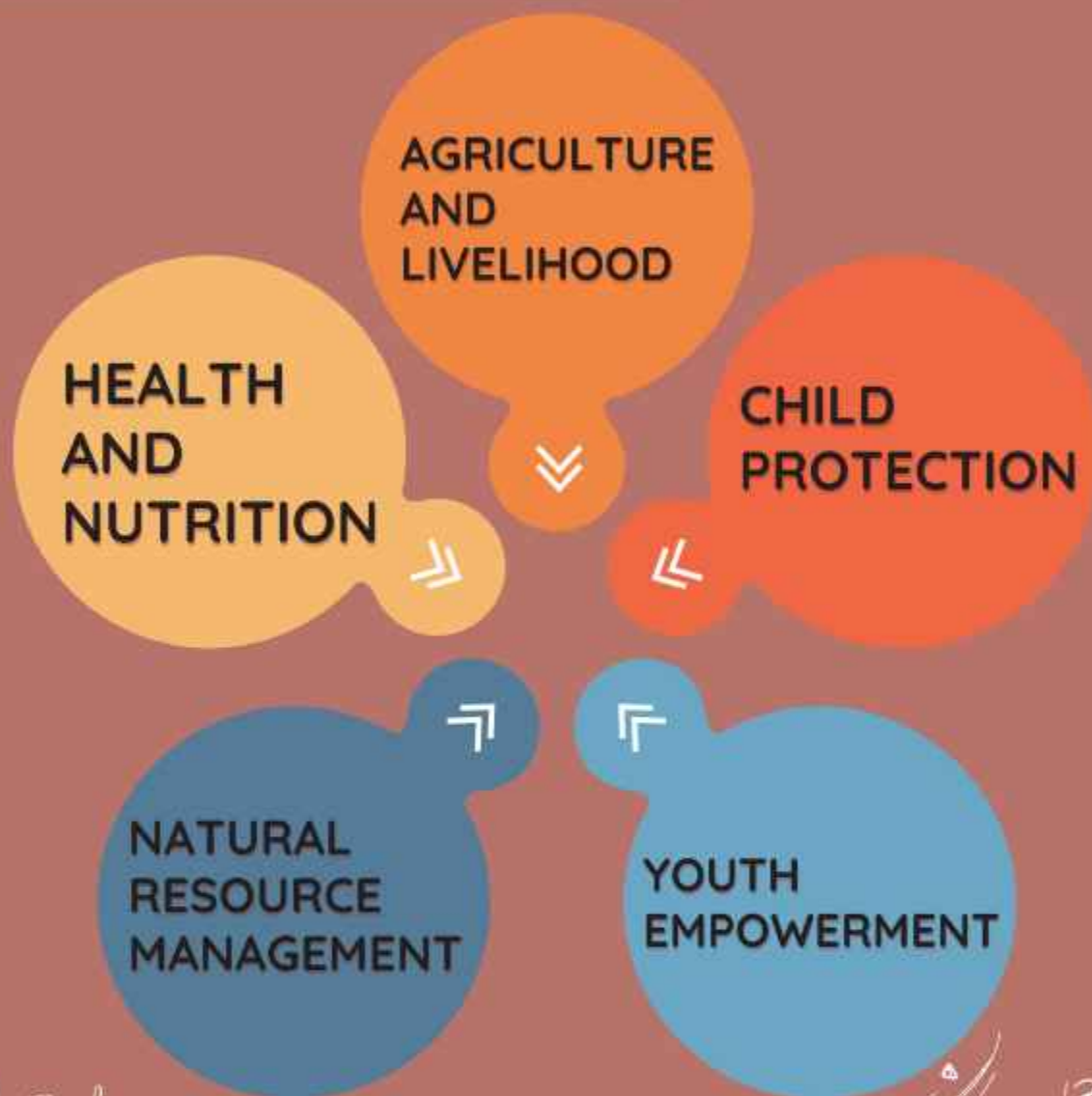
OUR ACCELERATION

AGRICULTURE AND LIVELIHOOD

Significant positive changes in livelihood especially agriculture:

The organization has realized various positive changes occurred among entire community especially agriculture productivity. Improved irrigation facilities have enabled for the farmers to diversify their crop cultivation, including grains, fruits, vegetables, and oil seeds. As per Government laws the mica mining has stopped in that area that's why Community people has realized that the agriculture is the best alternative livelihood opportunity. Recently, agricultural productivity has become crucial for ensuring food security in the organization's intervention areas while promoting environmental sustainability.



ACHIEVEMENTS

Farmers are using improved techniques such SRI method of paddy cultivation, intercropping for vegetables, and crop management. By applying these techniques, increased their income by 80% through vegetable sales and surplus production.

SUCCESS STORY

My name is Sunil Jonko. I am a young farmer from Komay village, Panchayat Baipi, Block Charkradharpur, West Singhbhum. There are 7 members in my family. Our family was poor, so I left school. My father used to grow paddy, but it was barely enough to eat, and we had no other income. Many boys from the village were migrating for work, so I went with them. After being away for 2 years, I came back to the village and met the project staff. They told me about the Kisan Club and invited me to join their meetings. I attended the Kisan Club meetings and learned new and simple farming methods, like making compost and pest repellents. I decided to plant tomatoes on 10 decimal land with my father's help. I bought seeds for Rs 200 and grew tomatoes. The tomato farming went well, and I earned Rs 4,500 by selling them at Rs 20 per kilo. Since then, I focused on vegetable farming. I started multi-layer farming and grew bottle gourd, lady's finger, brinjal, tomato, chilli, nenua, and cucumber. I invested Rs 5,500 and made a profit in 6 months. I have earned Rs 22,600 so far, and I expect to earn more as the produce is still coming.



YOUTH EMPOWERMENT



The organization's sustained efforts have fostered a positive shift in youth attitudes towards quality education and vocational training. This transformation extends beyond perception, as evidenced by the increasing demand for specific vocational courses. The focus has evolved from mere aspirations to concrete actions towards self-sufficiency. Many young people are now actively seeking opportunities to enhance their skills, reflecting a growing confidence in their ability to support themselves and contribute to their families' financial well-being. Youths who were disappointed with their future settlement, have hope to create their platform for development. Furthermore, the organization's initiative serves as a dual-purpose endeavour, not only focusing on the welfare of the youth but also contributing to livelihood generation, employment opportunities and economic sustainability. Youth, particularly girls, are increasingly motivated to earn income to support their families and invest in their siblings' and future generations' education. The growing participation of girls in the workforce is commendable and reflects a positive shift in societal attitudes. Beneficiary details are provided below.

SUCCESS STORY

"Breaking the Cycle: Pawan's Inspiring Story of Resilience and Progress "

Mr. Pawan Kumar Rai, a 21-year-old from Lachkan Village, Giridih, Jharkhand, grew up in poverty and faced significant challenges after losing his father. He supported his family by picking and selling mica scraps and working as a daily wage laborer in hazardous conditions. His life changed positively after participating in an awareness drive by the Savera Foundation. Pawan's routine involved searching for mica in dangerous, unregulated mines. His earnings were minimal, and the unsafe working conditions exposed him to health risks. Through the awareness drive, Pawan became motivated to make a difference. He joined a youth group and engaged in mental health counseling, life skills training, and career counseling, which inspired him to advocate for environmental protection and tree planting. Recognizing his interest in computers, the Savera Foundation set up a computer learning center in his area. Pawan attended classes, learned essential software, and aspired to master Adobe Photoshop and start a photo studio. With support, he is now working towards these goals. Pawan organizes rallies, street plays, and tree plantations, and interacts with officials to address environmental issues and village problems. His journey highlights the transformative impact of education and community support, showcasing his role as a catalyst for positive change.



HEALTH AND NUTRITION

Our mission is to advance health, nutrition, sanitation, and education for underserved communities, particularly focusing on young children and adolescents from families involved in mica mining. We provide comprehensive care to ensure their well-being and development from birth through adolescence.

“Our survivors’ group recently underwent training where they learned about the benefits of ragi (madua) millet and were trained in making ragi (madua) ladoo and nimkii”.

For newborns and children up to three years old, we offer specialized crèches where they receive essential health and nutrition services. At age three, they transition to Anganwadis, where they continue to receive early childhood education and nutritional support until age six.

We also support adolescents who have dropped out of school due to their families’ involvement in mica mining. Our programs include menstrual hygiene awareness for girls, covering sanitary pad use, menstrual health practices, and Iron-Folic Acid (IFA) supplements to prevent anemia. Boys are also educated on menstrual health and anemia prevention.

For pregnant women, we provide information on antenatal care, institutional delivery, and the Janani Suraksha Yojana (JSY) scheme. Transportation via Mamta Vahan services ensures timely medical care, improving health outcomes and supporting education in these communities.



MADUA LADOOS



MADUA NIMKII

In the tribal area of Koderma and Giridih district, Jharkhand, crèches (child care centers) focus on key activities to support young children's development and well-being

1. Early Childhood Education: Offering age-appropriate learning activities like storytelling, singing, and basic literacy.
2. Nutrition and Health: Providing nutritious meals, health check-ups, and vaccinations.
3. Skill Development: Engaging in activities to enhance motor, social, and cognitive skills.
4. Parental Education: Guiding parents on child-rearing, health, and nutrition.
5. Socialization: Encouraging peer interaction to develop social skills.
6. Cultural Activities: Integrating local traditions to connect children with their heritage.

Success Story

Enhancing Health Services in a Mica Mining Village

Chandrawati Devi (Sahiya), C/O Bhola Prasad Mehta, hails from Banderchowkwa village in Dagarnawa Panchayat, Markacho Block. Serving in a marginalized mica mining village with high health risks and a Community Health Center (CHC) 25 km away, Chandrawati faced challenges due to poor infrastructure and disorganized Village Health, Sanitation and Nutrition Day (VHSND) sessions. With support from the Savera Foundation and AEIN, she received training and educated community health workers (Sahiyas) on child and maternal health care, sanitation, pre- and post-pregnancy checkups, and the importance of four antenatal care (ANC) visits. Through home visits, she also taught women about proper nutrition and breastfeeding techniques. Her dedication led to significant improvements in maternal and child health and inspired other Sahiyas. Recognized by the "National Rural Health Mission" at the block level, she received a scooter and smartphone, further motivating others to enhance their performance. This story underscores the impact of dedicated health workers in marginalized areas.



CHILD PROTECTION



Savera Foundation is dedicated to combating abuse and exploitation, ensuring that children are protected, empowered to exercise their rights, and able to develop their talents and capabilities in a safe and secure environment. We are committed to fostering collective leadership among survivors, advocating for their rights, and providing opportunities for children to participate in decisions that affect their lives. Our efforts include preventing child marriage by educating adolescents and their communities, eradicating child labor by raising awareness and implementing protective strategies, combating human trafficking by equipping adolescents with the knowledge to protect themselves and their peers, and promoting the dignity of life by creating an environment where every adolescent can live free from exploitation and abuse, contributing positively to their communities.

ACHIEVEMENTS

- 10** Ten survivor groups have been formed, comprising 75 individuals who have survived child trafficking and child labor, providing them with support and a platform.
- 7** Seven drop-out survivors have been successfully reintegrated into formal education, providing them with renewed opportunities for learning and personal development after overcoming significant challenges.
- 26** 26 survivors were empowered with skills in Stitching, Food Processing, and Artificial Jewellery making to support their journey toward economic independence.
- 9** 9 forced child marriages have been prevented by the help of community interaction and local leaders
- 10** 10 children have been rescued from trafficking, highlighting the power of collaborative efforts in safeguarding vulnerable young lives.
- 300** Provide 300 adolescent girls and boys with essential life skills training to build their confidence, decision-making abilities, and resilience.



A Triumph Against Child Trafficking: The Courageous Efforts of Tisri Police and Savera Foundation

In a remarkable display of dedication, Tisri Police thwarted a child trafficking attempt, rescuing two teenage girls from potential exploitation. The operation, conducted at Tisri Chowk in the Tisri police station area, underscores the crucial role of vigilance and collaboration between law enforcement and community organizations.

The case began when one of the field animators from the Savera Foundation received confidential information about a suspected trafficking operation. They learned that two teenage girls from Nagdi village were being taken out of the area by individuals who had lured them with promises of money and work.

Recognizing the gravity of the situation, our field animators promptly informed the Tisri Police.

Acting on this tip, Tisri Police, led by the Station In-Charge, quickly set up a checkpoint at Tisri Chowk. Their response was timely. When a vehicle carrying the girls, along with a woman and two men, approached the checkpoint, the police stopped it and detained everyone inside. The suspects, residents of Chakai in Bihar, were taken into custody, and the girls were safely brought to the police station.

Once in custody, the teenagers provided disturbing accounts of deceit and manipulation. They had been lured with false promises of a better life, only to be trafficked for labor. After thorough questioning, the police transferred the girls to the Child Welfare Committee (CWC) in Giridih, which is now ensuring their care and protection. The investigation into the trafficking network is ongoing.

This operation highlights the importance of community vigilance and the crucial role of the Savera Foundation. Our team members pro-active actions and collaboration with law enforcement were key in preventing a tragedy. The Tisri Police, under Sanjay Nayak's leadership, showed exemplary efficiency, ensuring the girls' safety and capturing the traffickers.

The successful rescue at Tisri Chowk not only saved the girls from a dire fate but also sent a strong message to those who exploit the innocent, demonstrating the impact of unified efforts against child trafficking.



NATURAL RESOURCE MANAGEMENT

Our natural resource management initiatives aim to sustainably enhance water resources, prevent soil erosion, and promote biodiversity to support rural livelihoods and environmental preservation. Key activities include constructing ponds near households to boost groundwater recharge and ensure water availability during summer. Gully plugs and sand bag dams slow water flow and increase groundwater levels, while trench cum bunds capture hillside runoff, aiding soil retention and water conservation. We also focus on planting native species and distributing fruit trees to prevent erosion and provide fresh produce. Seed balls, prepared by children and spread on barren lands, help restore native vegetation and promote environmental awareness.



Regular community meetings guide watershed management, ensuring these initiatives are community-driven and effective. Together, these efforts conserve natural resources, support sustainable livelihoods, and foster environmental stewardship.

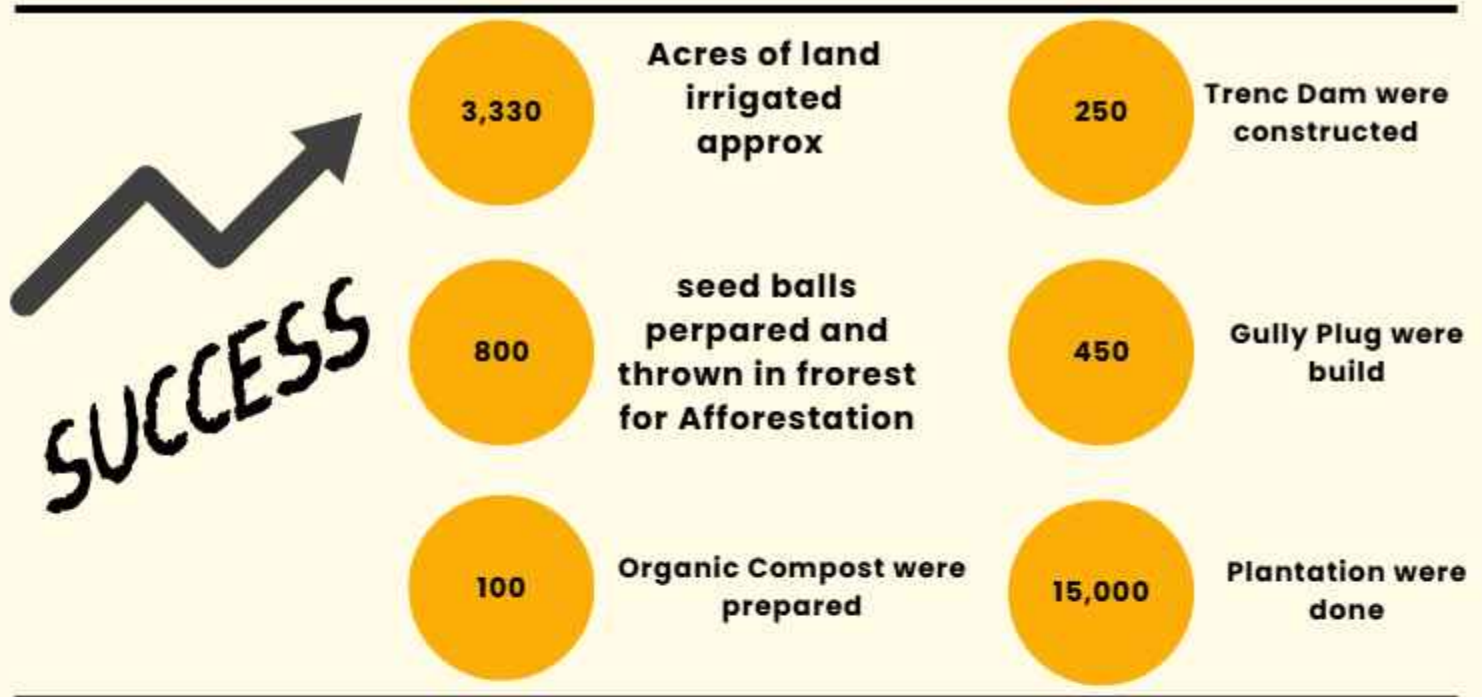

Success Story

Kaushalya Devi, D/o- Ganori Kumar, Vill: Arraiyah, Panchayat: Dagarnawan, Koderma is an aspiring farmer of her village. She always show her interest to learn new ways of agriculture and enhance her income. But people in her village generally suffer due to scarcity of water. Kaushalya herself planned to migrate outside in search of job due to low profit in agriculture. Meanwhile she contacted one of the field animators of the organization and narrated her whole story. The field animator oriented her about watershed management activities which can increase the water level in her village. She was interested in this and mobilized all the women of her village to contribute in Socc earning activities. The women actively participated in all the voluntary contribution activities and helped in selecting the sites for the ponds. Kaushalaya and other women agreed to consider the ponds as the resources of the village and everyone have equal rights on it. Further they had a consent that each and every beneficiary will be responsible for the management of the ponds. The Socc redeeming activities gave Kaushalya and other women employment for two months. Kaushalya earned an amount of Rs. 20,000 from which she invested in purchasing fish fingerlings. She got 300 Kg of fishes which she sold Rs. 200 per kg. She was very happy due to this and thanked her village and the organization for such a step. Now she can cultivate vegetables due to availability of water and consume nutritious food and sell the surplus. She is on the way of becoming self dependent and her dream to become an entrepreneur came true.



Child Safeguarding Committee



The Child Safeguarding Committee (CSC) in this organization consisting of five core members namely Mr. Amar Kumar Pathak, Mr. Ajay Mishra, Mrs. Priyanka Paul, Ms. Sritama Pal and Mrs. Sukhmati Marandi. The objective of this committee is to ensure child safeguarding policies to all children, monitoring and evaluating the safeguarding measures as well as creating a safe environment for the children.

In the project reporting period, total 2 meetings were conducted by this committee, one meeting was held on online mode in the month of January, 2024 and another one meeting was conducted on offline mode by the five core members of this committee in the month of June, 2024 at Savera Foundation office. In these two meeting, some topics that were taken into the discussion are as follows-

1. Organization's governing body members, staff, donors and volunteers, every individual follow the Child Protection Policy and they must abide by the principles.
2. It was discussed that all the staff would ensure the four basic rights of the child proposed by UNCRC.
3. A complain box should be checked, available in the office on regular basis.
4. At least the 5 core members of the committee should be present in a quarterly meeting.
5. 5 core members are reoriented on the objectives of child safeguarding policy in online meeting such as,
 - Ensuring every child feels safe and secure during any engagement the organization has with them, directly or indirectly.
 - Ensuring that the organization has strong preventive and redressal measures for child protection.
 - Raising public awareness and educate various stakeholders on child rights and child protection.
6. Committee members are asked to share their field experience if any such cases occur.
7. In the meeting it is also talked about two dropped out adolescents from project area who have taken admission in high school. The organization's committee supported in education and ensuring their basic rights and protection.
8. It is discussed that every individual associated with organization must take permission from the child and parents while meeting the child, talking with the child and clicking photos.

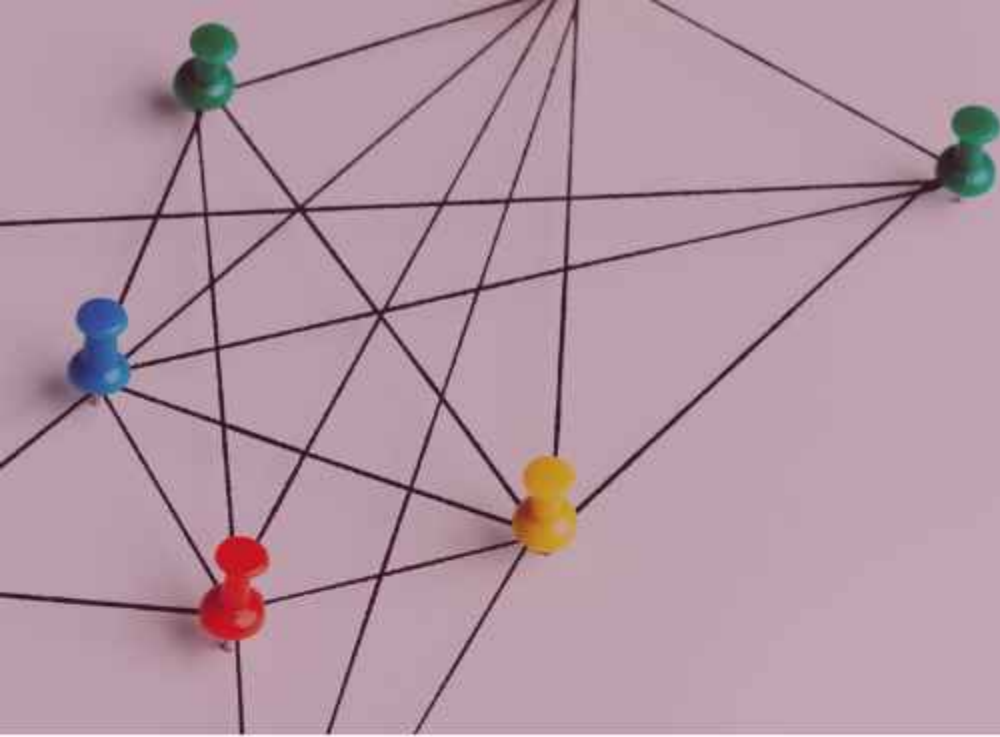
